CELEBRATING THE CENTENARY: 26TH MAY 2012

Plans are in hand to celebrate the centenary of the establishment of the Foundation in 2012, with a special Founder's Day on Saturday 26th May. The bequest that our Founder, Lord Wandsworth, left on his death in 1912 led to the establishment of the Lord Wandsworth Institution, which evolved into the College we see today. The College still has Lord Wandsworth's aims at heart – to provide an education for children who had lost one or both parents, but has expanded and developed to provide a great education for all our pupils.

MATT'S MISSION DISCOVERY

6th former Matt Mwale was blasted into space camp in the summer, enjoying presentations from astronauts and physics challenges based on conditions in space. Matt's team came up with a proposal to use grapheme (a nano-material) to detect the Earth's magnetic field. At the end of the intensive week of research and discussions, the team was called upon to present their idea to a panel of mathematicians and astronauts before the grand finale watching the launch of a space probe. "The academic challenge turned out to be just as great as the challenge of team-work and presentation skills," observed Matt. "It has been a really valuable experience for me and I have thoroughly enjoyed it. I would also like to thank Hook and Odiham Rotary for their sponsorship which allowed me to attend the camp."

BURN OFF

At the end of the harvest, LWC's farm manager Paul Sigley clears the linseed straw by burning it. The fibres of the straw (which can also be used in the production of linen) are tough and decompose slowly, but they burn very quickly and at very high temperatures. "The fires are quite dramatic," comments Paul, "but they are a very effective way to clear the field and reduce the volume of weeds and pests, meaning we spray less in the spring."



ICELAND

A group of LWC students spent a week in Iceland over the summer investigating the extraordinary natural phenomena of the volcanic island. The trip focused on the incredible volcanoes, waterfalls and glaciers of the island, plus the hot tubs found at every



location. Students spent many hours relaxing in the hot waters of the geothermal heated pools. "Iceland is a fascinating place to gain practical experience of some very unusual forms of nature. We've been very lucky to see so much in only one week," commented 4th former Peter Bailey.





LINK TO CHILDREN

At the end of every term the LWC lost property box yields its unclaimed treasures to the generous hands of 85-year old David Kamsler MBE. David runs a charity called "The Link" finding new homes for unused or unwanted items. U6 TEST THEIR FRENCH AT WORK

In the Autumn half term, LWC's Upper 6th French students spent a week undertaking work experience in Normandy primary schools and in the *Office de Tourisme* in Bayeux. The visit coincided with the *'Semaine du goût'*, giving Jess Mann and Nick Scott the chance to make medieval 'blanc manger' and ending the week at one of the top local hotels making meringues. After only one day, the French children had taught their new teachers to play 'c'est toi le chat' (Manhunt) and l'épervier (British Bulldog), with LWC upholding its reputation for sporting prowess in the playground and in the local *stade*.

The LWC students spent one day at the *Mémorial* peace museum in Caen, joining workshops on their A2 cultural topic of life in occupied France. Students also enjoyed meeting the Mayor of the Commune, who had lived through the Occupation as a child, and came to talk about his experiences and to answer their questions about his memories of life in occupied France.





FAIR COPSE

LWC is putting its woodlands to use by using logs from Sheephouse Copse in a new biomass heating system in the Grounds department, replacing an old oil-fired boiler. After a four year payback period, the new boiler should bring an annual saving of around £8,000.

MATHS MOVES IN

The first week of the new academic year saw the opening of a brand new facility at LWC that has quickly become a firm favourite among all members of the College. The Prideaux Building is the new home for the entire maths department, as well as the smaller departments serving 6th formers only – Economics, Business Studies, Psychology and Careers. It also hosts a brand new dance studio with state of the art audio visual systems, doubling up as a conference venue seating 120 people.

The building was opened by former Chairman of LWC Governors, Sir Humphrey Prideaux, who in his 95th year is still a regular visitor to the College and provides advice and insight from a position of 50 years of service to LWC.

Pupils and staff are equally enthusiastic about their new classrooms. "The rooms are really bright and airy and have all the equipment we need to teach really effective lessons," comments LWC's Head of Maths Becky Lovelock. "The corridors are wide and the lighting is excellent – it's a real pleasure to work in such an intelligently-designed and well-constructed building."

"Maths is my favourite subject now!" adds an enthusiastic 3rd former.





iSing ON THE CAKE

In September the Juniors were given a treat when Dominic Peckham, the Assistant Director of the National Youth Choir and Artistic Director of iSing, gave a singing workshop. Once the pupils had been taught how a singer stands and how a singer breathes, they learned "O re a mi je ka jo (ello ello!)" and combined a number of songs in a "mash-up".

Soloists and ensembles performed brilliantly at an informal concert in front of parents at the end of the day, having learned new skills and techniques with an inspirational teacher.

REFEREES

Thirteen pupils took their first steps towards becoming rugby referees when they attended an RFU Young Officials Award at LWC. Run by Hampshire RFU Community Rugby coach, Sharon Evans, the pupils learnt practical aspects of refereeing including managing the scrum and breakdown situations. Active sessions gave them a chance to experience refereeing for themselves. 5th former Tom Burgess, said "It was a great course and I learnt a lot more about what a complicated job the referee has. I'm keen to finish the award and go further with refereeing." The pupils will now be working hard to complete the practical part of the course in order to gain the full qualification.

BACK TOGETHER AGAIN

The summer of 2011 was an important milestone for the College and the Foundation as the two charities have merged together once more, under the name of Lord Wandsworth College.

The initial separation of the two took place in the 1970s when there was a real fear that the Labour government would end the charitable status of independent schools and threaten the future of the Foundation's work at LWC. Thirty five years later, that threat has been reversed and the merger offers an opportunity to simplify the management of the College's structure and refinance the Foundation in order to safeguard its future.

The newly merged charity, registered number 1143359, retains the same objectives and criteria for selection of Foundationers: to provide assisted boarding places for those who have lost the support of one or both parents through death, divorce or separation. 
LWC IN 10 OBJECTS

MALTA DIVE

During the summer, six LWC students, in the care of Sternian Sean Edwards who runs his own dive academy, travelled to Gozo, one of the three islands making up Malta. With temperatures as high as 36 degrees, the students were relieved to spend much of their time in the water, making up to three dives every day. For some students, this was their first experience of open water diving and with striking underwater topography such as the Blue Hole and Inland Sea it was a great place to start. They also saw an array of Mediterranean sea-life including octopus, barracuda, baby moray eels and some stunning cuttlefish during a night dive. The highlight of the trip was a wreck dive at 40m, in very cold water. "With so much practice, we were able to overcome the challenges of buoyancy, air consumption and cold temperatures but the highlight was the wreck dive, swimming through the engine room and exploring the lower decks of this ship was incredible," says Chris Stanton.
